That lesson has made me unafraid to raise my hand in class, ask a teacher for extra help when I needed it, or even challenge my high school when they said that a year early graduation couldn't be achieved. I do not shy away from difficult conversations because I've seen that respectful, yet firm dialogue is how problems get solved. Because of these conversations and negotiations, I was able to work with my school leaders, and this is how we developed a plan that allowed me to still graduate as a Junior; despite my study abroad which I knew would derail my initial plans. Not only did I graduate an entire year early, but I was also one of the first Juniors to graduate as a valedictorian! The other early Junior graduate valedictorian and I quickly bonded over this similarity, much like I've seen happen when talking about what a benefit it is to be part of a union in general.

These lessons have given me confidence, not just in myself, but in others. I know that I do not have to do everything alone, and I know that real strength comes from standing shoulder to shoulder with others. Whether I'm speaking in front of my class, helping a friend through a tough time, or thinking about my future, I do so with the pride and grounding that comes from being raised in a union family. I know how to listen, to organize, and to lead with heart.

College will bring about new challenges, but thanks to my union upbringing, I'm walking in hopeful; but also fully prepared to stand my ground with confidence and respect. Union life didn't just shape the person I am, it shaped the student and leader I'm becoming. Now as I step into college, I will carry those lessons with me. They have made me self-assured, self-aware, assertive, and ready to lead!
